We hope you and the children you minister to enjoy it as much as we have enjoyed preparing it for you!

There are a few hints we can give to help you use the material most effectively:

1. The curriculum is written conversationally to help new teachers get the feel of speaking to children. Experienced teachers love it, too, because they already know how to glean the best from their material and add their own touches!

2. We have included a couple of encouraging notes for your teachers from Miss Pat -- we pray that you and your team is blessed as you work on these lessons and that God's word comes even more alive in you and that it becomes real to the children through you.

3. Story-based! Our curriculum is story-based, meaning much of the lesson theme is centered around the story. No matter where we go, or what age group we speak to, kids like stories! Plain and simple. So, don't leave out the story ... leave out a game or something! That may sound weird, but they really remember the stories and if we tie the truth to a story and they remember the story ... well, you can come to the conclusion yourself!

4. Here are some suggestions on how to use the stories and pictures.

a) Take the black and white pictures and copy them onto transparencies. Then have one of your adult helpers color them with dry erase markers while you read the story. This is an unbelievable attention keeper!

b) No transparency machine? Color the pictures and show them, or

c) Have a worker color them while you are reading.

d) Give copies to the children and let them look over the pictures, or color them while you read. You can let take them home and finish them, they just have to move to the next one when you are ready in the story!

e) If you need them for a big audience without a transparency machine, you can go to Kinko's and they will enlarge them onto any size posterboard you would like.

5. Miss Pat prefers the games be centered around the memory verse. We have included a game idea in most lessons, but we would rather spend the time on a fun activity involving the memory verse.

6. We enjoy puppets tremendously, but know that many times puppeteers are hard to come by so, if you don't have a team right now, just switch the puppet skits to live skits. If you have a goofy helper they can be just as much fun ... add a silly hat or wig, crazy glasses and misfitting clothes and POOF! you have a funny skit that the kids will talk about all day.

We have used a special set of scripts for a lamb puppet in this set. There are many inexpensive (and expensive) lamb puppets available and because of the versatility of references to lambs in the Bible, we are sure you will find many uses for him once you get used to using him. Because the lamb skits are so fun ... we encourage you to try to incorporate this puppet if at all possible!).

7. You will find a memory verse paper provided to make life one little jot easier for you! Copy on colored paper (just because it's more fun) and hand out to your children! Included on the Memory Verse paper is a question from the story that will hopefully spark a conversation at their home so the children can relate the awesome things they are learning in Children's Church!

8. Thank you for obeying Psalm 78:48 "We will not hide these truths from our children, but will tell the next generation about the glorious deeds of the LORD. We will tell of his power and the mighty miracles he did." Thank you ... I pray blessings upon you! Miss Pat



LORD'S PRAYER Week I

Io THE TEACHER

(For your devotion in preparing the lesson.)

As we begin the series on The Lord's Prayer, take some time and ask God to open your eyes to what He wants to say through this prayer. While preparing this curriculum for you, so much revelation on the reality of every verse in this prayer has come to light. I pray that the same would happen to you, but you have to choose to let Him speak to you. Don't just go through and see what you need to have ready for class, ask God to bring this prayer to life for you. Then you'll REALLY have something to share with the kids.

PRE-SERVICE ACTIVITY

As the kids come in for the first day of this series, have half sheets of paper available to them and colored pencils or markers. Ask them to draw a picture of prayer -- don't define it too much for them -- let their imagination work. Then display the pictures. Make sure their names are on them. If you can display them somewhere that they can remain for the full 8 weeks, it will be interesting to see if they want to change their picture or add to it after the series is done.

WORSHIP NUGGET

(Share with the children prior to worship.)

Do you remember when you were little (kids love for you to remind them of when they were little -- it is a way of saying they are growing up) and you would climb in your Daddy's lap for him to read to you or watch TV together or maybe just to be held? Jesus called God "Abba Father". Abba actually means daddy. What a wonderful picture of God. Today, as we go into worship, let's think about God as our Daddy. He is longing for us to come to Him for a visit. He doesn't care how well you sing or how well you know the words ... He just wants you to reach out to Him as your Father.









In your prayer after worship, be sure to express your love to God as your Father, your Daddy. He loves you that way too, Teacher.

offering nugget

Have you ever had someone tell you that you remind them of your Dad? (Let kids respond. Tell them if you look or act like your dad.) Some kids love it when they hear that and others hate it ... but if we think about God being our Daddy, wouldn't it be great for someone to say that we remind them of our Father God? Now, it would take forever to discuss everything there is to know about God. So, as we prepare to give our offering, let's talk about how generous God is. All through the Bible we see Him taking care of His people, providing for the prophets, for widows, for sick people ... He even gave His only Son. He is a giving God. One way that we can "be like our Dad" is to be givers. That includes our offering, yes, but it also includes being generous any chance we can. Are you like your generous Dad? Are you a giver? I hope you are. Let's get our offerings ready today ... and if you didn't bring an offering today, remember this thought when you get your allowance this week, put some aside to give back to God!

MEMORY VERSE ACTIVITY

For the next 8 weeks we are going to work on hand motions to The Lord's Prayer. At the end of the 8 weeks you will all be able to show and tell The entire Prayer. So ... everyone up ... we are going to work on the first little part today. Then we will add a chunk every week and go over the motions we already learned.

(Refer to hand motion sheet -- in front of the Table of Contents.)

BIBLE LESSON

There are so many verses that talk about God being our father. One of the most famous is from Isaiah 9:6 -- we hear this verse every Christmas. "Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father..." What do you think 'Everlasting Father' means, boys and girls? (Let kids respond for a few minutes. Don't comment right or wrong, just encourage them to think and talk. If you listen to their answers, they will listen to yours!)





There are so many problems in families today. It used to be that every family had a mom and a dad. Nowadays that is not necessarily true. (There are probably various family situations represented in your classroom -- so be very careful that your comments are neutral, not judgemental!) Nowadays there are all kinds of mixes in families. So it gets a little tricky to understand what the father of a household meant back in the Bible days. The father was the one that the blessing came from. The father was the one the bloodline came through. The father was the strong central figure. And if the father was taken from the family, the family was in big trouble. Today we see families being raised by moms and being okay. But I will tell you that is not how God intended for it to be ... He is a great help to moms without husbands, but He intended for the dad to be like Him ... strong, caring, loving, providing, and always there. That was His intent. And that is the kind of father He is.

(This subject will be a little emotional for a few of your kids. Take an emotional break and have a race looking up the next verse.) Ok, boys and girls, get your Bibles ready we are going to race to see who can find this verse the fastest. Ready? Set? Look up Matthew 6:25! (Wait for everyone to have it -- I always encouraged the older ones to help the younger ones.) Read verses 25-33. We see our Father God's caring nature in this verse. The Bible tells us not to worry about food or clothes ... our heavenly Father knows we need them AND HE CARES!

Now let's look up Ephesians 1:3. (Let kids look it up and then call one one of them to read it out loud.) Paul wants us blessed ... and what kind of blessing? The blessing of the Father ... grace and peace from our Father. He is a true Father than wants to bless His children, and Paul understood that. We should understand that, too. He wants only good things for you, boys and girls. He wants your life to be blessed.

Ok ... now we are going to the Old Testament. Ready? Look up Jeremiah 29:11. I love this verse ... (Read the verse.) It tells us that God, our Father, has great things planned for us. He has your future planned out ... and it is a good plan. Now I want to share with you one more verse ... keep your Bibles at Jeremiah. I will just read Matthew 28:20 -- "And be sure of this: I am with you always, even to the end of the age." God is our Everlasting Father. He always has been and He always will be and He has promised to be with us always. There is no one, never has been anyone, and never will be anyone we can count on more









than our Heavenly Father. I told you we are learning what is called "The Lord's Prayer." Jesus taught this prayer and He wouldn't have told us to call out to a Father that wouldn't listen, would He? No. Father God hears us when we call.

AND He wants us to be with Him. Flip over to Jeremiah 31:33. This is a beautiful message from our Father God. (Read verse.) He draws us to Himself by His loving kindness, boys and girls. We not only have an amazing Eternal Father, who loves us and cares about everything that has to do with us ... but He wants us with Him ... He will even draw us to Him.

Ok, sit back. I have a story for you. We are going to meet a couple of new friends today.

TRANSPARENCY STORY

Copy the pictures onto transparencies. Have one worker color the pictures with dry erase markers as you (or another worker) reads the story. When it is time to switch pictures say "beep" and the helper starts on the next picture. It is better to not use a child as it gets very competitive and sometimes you lose the message in the story if they are struggling with the transparencies and they usually don't like (in my experience) to stop coloring before the picture is done! Of course, adults don't either!

Trouble in Space

Transparency #1

object lesson

You need a strong magnet. A good magnet can be purchased from the educational section of a toy store. Or borrow one from a school teacher. You also need a few things for the magnet to pick up ... paper clips are cool because they string together, straight pins are fun, and a couple of bigger things; spoon, big nail, etc.

I am guessing you all know what this is (hold up the magnet). Right, it is a magnet. Now, who is a science brain in here and can tell me how a magnet works? (Let the kids explain ... they probably all know from science class!) That is right, it has a drawing power that simply pulls stuff to itself. Check this out. (Perform some tasks with the magnet ... this is for visual effect ... have fun with it. Pick up stuff, make the paper clips string along. Give the kids a few turns at picking stuff up. Make them think the lesson is over and they are just having fun.)







After you have worked with the magnet for a few minutes, take the magnet back and as you pick up something with the magnet say: This is how it is with God and us, boys and girls. He pulls us to Himself just like a magnet. And if we don't fight Him, we will be in His hold and His care and His protection. He wants you next to Him just like this magnet wants this paper clip. Don't ever forget that! No matter what you have done or said or felt or thought, God wants you with Him ... He will forgive you if you do wrong and keep on loving you. He is an Everlasting Father. Kind of like the Energizer Bunny ... He keeps loving and loving!

We are going to use a lamb puppet in all the lessons for this series.

Teacher: Well, the shepherd doesn't exactly wander off Larry: Teacher: Hmmm ... I wonder who does the wandering then ... Well ... I didn't mean to. Larry: Teacher: (very sarcastically) What happened? I didn't mean to wander that far off. I really didn't. Larry: I thought the whole flock was traveling that direction. Just a few days before this happened, the Shepherd had told me that I was a good leader. So I thought I was just leading. I didn't know no one was with me. Teacher: Larry:	Really? Really! So I opened my mouth to call for the Shepherd again and I heard something behind me. And what do you think it was?
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

Instead of a "game" game today ... our suggestion is to let the kids play with the magnet. If you can gather a few different magnets with different strengths, they will have a good time seeing how many objects they can pick up with each. If you can secure two strong magnets, you can have them compete for how many paperclips they can pick up. Let them connect some clips together and see how long of a string their magnet will drag around. Kids love to play with equipment, so don't rush this. Finish the lesson completely and they can experiment with the magnets until the parents come.
